How We Use Your Information

SCHOOL MISSION

We are inspired by St Catherine of Siena, who said 'Be who God wants you to be, and you will set the world on fire', to form young women of confidence and compassion, ready for service and leadership in the world. We fulfil our mission through these values:

Community: a place of cheerfulness, dignity and tolerance, where all are welcome

Faith: a Christ-centred school with time for reflection; a culture of gratitude and friendship

Courage: with self-knowledge, resilience and integrity, and a readiness for challenge

Introduction

This notice is to help you understand **how** and **why** we collect your personal information and **what** we do with that information. It also explains the decisions that you can make about your own information.

Who we are

You already know that your school is called St Catherine's but we have to tell you that the school is the organisation which is in charge of your personal information. This means the school is called the Data Controller.

If you want to contact us about your personal information you can contact our Data Protection Lead who is Mr Ian Stewart, the Bursar and Clerk to the Governors. You can speak to him in school or you can leave a letter at reception or send one by post.

What is "personal information"?

Personal information is information that the School collects about you. This includes information such as your name, date of birth and address as well as things like exam results,

medical details and behaviour records. The School may also record your religion or ethnic group. CCTV, photos and video recordings of you are also personal information.

How we use pupil information

At St Catherine's School we collect and hold personal information relating to our pupils and may also receive information about them from their previous school, local authority and/or the Department for Education (DfE). We use this personal data to:

- support your learning
- monitor and report on your progress
- provide appropriate care for you; and
- assess the quality of our services
- to comply with the law about sharing personal data

This information will include your contact details, national curriculum assessment results, attendance information, any exclusion information, where you go after you leave us and personal characteristics such as your ethnic group, any special educational needs you may have as well as relevant medical information. We will also use photographs of you, as appropriate, when publicising events with parents, or for advertising; the use of pupil photographs is part of the Terms and Conditions which your parents sign, for your enrolment at the School.

For pupils enrolling for post 14 qualifications, the Learning Records Service will give us the unique learner number (ULN) and may also give us details about your learning or qualifications.

The use of your information for these purposes is lawful for the following reasons:

- The school is under a legal obligation to collect the information or the information is necessary for us to meet legal requirements imposed upon us such as our duty to safeguard pupils.
- It is necessary for us to hold and use your information for the purposes of our functions in providing schooling and so we can look after our pupils. This is a function which is in the public interest because everybody needs to have an education. This means we have a real and proper reason to use your information.
- We will not usually need your consent to use your information. However, if at any time it appears to us that we would like to use your personal data in a way which means that we would need your consent then we will explain to you what we want to do and ask you for consent. This is most likely to be where we are involved in activities which are not really part of our job as a school but we are involved because we think it would benefit our pupils. If you give your consent, you may change your mind at any time. If we think that you will not understand what we are asking then we will ask your parent or carer instead. Usually, we will involve your parents even if you can make your own decision.

When we collect personal information on our forms, we will make it clear whether there is a legal requirement for you/your parents to provide it, whether there is a legal requirement

on the school to collect it. If there is no legal requirement then we will explain why we need it and what the consequences are if it is not provided.

When we give your information to others

Once pupils reach the age of 13, the law requires us to pass on certain information to The London Borough of Richmond's Service for Schools that has responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds. We may also share certain personal data relating to children aged 16 and over with post-16 education and training providers in order to secure appropriate services for them. A parent/guardian can request that **only** their daughter's name, address and date of birth be passed to The London Borough of Richmond's Service for Schools by informing the Admissions Manager. This right is transferred to you once you reach the age of 16. For more information about services for young people, please go to our local authority website:

As part of our commitment to providing an education which prepares our pupils for their future careers, we may also pass your details to outside agencies. For example, all girls in Year 12 are given free membership to ISCO, the Independent Schools Careers Organisation. ISCO profile girls and give them an individual careers interview. Details are also passed to UCAS to enable pupils to be registered to apply for university.

In order to ensure that our teaching is tailored to the ability of all of our pupils, students sit online tests for the CEM Centre at Durham University. This allows MidYIS baseline data to be generated for Years 7 and 9 and ALIS for Year 12.

We will not give information about our pupils to anyone without your consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so. If you want to receive a copy of the information about you that we hold, please contact the Admissions Manager:

The DfE may also share information about pupils that we give to them, with other people or organisations. This will only take place where the law, including the law about data protection allows it.

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department. It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

The DfE may share information about our pupils from the NPD with third parties who promote the education or well-being of children in England by:

- conducting research or analysis
- producing statistics
- providing information, advice or guidance

The Department has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of our data is maintained and there are stringent controls in place regarding access and use of the data. Decisions on whether DfE releases data to third parties are subject to a strict approval process and based on a detailed assessment of:

- who is requesting the data
- the purpose for which it is required
- the level and sensitivity of data requested: and
- the arrangements in place to store and handle the data

To be granted access to pupil information, organisations must comply with strict terms and conditions covering the confidentiality and handling of the data, security arrangements and retention and use of the data.

We will also normally give information about you to your parents or your main carer. Where appropriate, we will listen to your views first. We will also take family circumstances into account, in particular where a Court has decided what information a parent is allowed to have.

We will also disclose your personal data to:

- Your new school if you move schools
- Disclosures connected with SEND support – e.g. non-LA professionals [explain what these are]
- School Nurse
- School Caterer (re allergies or dietary requirements)
- School Counsellor
- CAMHS (Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service)

The information disclosed to these people/services will include sensitive personal information about you. Usually this means information about your health and any special educational needs or disabilities which you have. We do this because these people need the information so that they can support you.

Our disclosure of your personal data is lawful for the following reasons:

- The School is under a legal obligation to disclose the information or disclosing the information is necessary for us to meet legal requirements imposed upon us such as our duty to look after our pupils and protect them from harm.
- It is necessary for us to disclose your information for the purposes of our functions in providing schooling. This is a function which is in the public interest.
- We have a legitimate interest in disclosing your information because it is necessary in order to provide our pupils with education and pastoral care and connected purposes as outlined above.
- We will not usually need consent to disclose your information. However, if at any time it appears to us that we would need consent then this will be sought before a disclosure is made.

It is in your vital interests for your personal information to be passed to these people or services. We will ask you for consent once we think that you can understand what we are asking. This is because the law requires us to ask you if you can understand. Normally, we involve your parents too. By law we won't need their consent if you can give it but parents like to be involved because it is part of looking after you. Before you are old enough to understand we will ask your parents to consent for you.

If you are joining a school trip that will travel overseas, you will be asked to provide your passport information. This may be shared with outside organisations, including airlines, hotels and the British Council. As this information is shared in order to allow the trip to go ahead, it is done on the legal basis that we are complying with a legal obligation and/or of fulfilling a contract, in this case enabling us to provide a service you have requested. Any passport data held by the school will be destroyed after the trip has returned.

We do not normally transfer your information to a different country which is outside the European Economic Area. This would only happen if one of your parents lives abroad or if you move to a new school abroad. If this happens we will be very careful to make sure that it is safe to transfer your information. We will look at whether that other country has good data protection laws for example. If we cannot be sure that it is safe then we will talk to you and your parents about it and make sure that you are happy for us to send your information. As this is not something we normally do and we do not know which country we might need to send your information to, we cannot tell you more about it now but if we want to transfer your data to a different country then we will tell you whether or not we think it is safe and why we have decided that.

How long we keep your information

We only keep your information for as long as we need to or for as long as the law requires us to. Most of the information we have about you will be in our pupil file. We usually keep these until your 25th birthday unless you move to another school in which case we send your file to your new school. We have a Record Keeping Policy which explains how long we keep information.

You have these rights:

- You can ask us for a copy of the information we have about you

- You can ask us to correct any information we have about you if you think it is wrong
- You can ask us to erase information about you (although we may have good reasons why we cannot do this)
- You can ask us to limit what we are doing with your information
- You can object to what we are doing with your information
- You can ask us to transfer your information to another organisation in a format that makes it easy for them to use.

There is more information in our Data Protection Policy or you can ask the Data Protection Lead.

You can complain about what we do with your personal information. If you are not happy with our answer to your complaint then you can complain to the Information Commissioner's Office:
