Year 4 National Archives Trip

Year 4 had a great visit to the National Archives. We learned how to be historians, by examining documents from the past, including criminal records of suffragettes, a map of the Great Fire of London and a Court document from the time of Henry VII.







Last week, the Prep school community was able to gather to celebrate the harvest season. Parents were invited into the Main Hall for a Harvest Festival with prayers, songs, poems and celebrations. There was a lovely display in the Hall with donations and beautiful artwork from the pupils. Alice in Year 1 stated, "I hope people like the food we brought them", and Klara in Year 4 commented that she "liked the harvest because we celebrated God and thanked God".

Mrs Mcfarlene-Barrow, our Assistant Chaplain, opened with a prayer to remind us of the reasons for harvest and we invited the parents to join us singing 'Plough the Fields and Scatter'. Then, Year 3 opened the service with a lovely poem and song followed by Years 1 and 2 who put smiles on the faces of everyone as 'The Singing Vegetables'. Year 5 gave two lovely accounts of autumnal poetry while Georgia and Bella in Year 6 delivered a reading about 'a time for everything' from Ecclesiastes 3:1-8, and the whole Prep School sang together to praise God for everyone. Elena and Neeve closed the festival with a lovely prayer and drew our attention to the thankfulness that we all should have at this time of year.



As part of our History topic on World War II this term, Year 6 visited Henley Fort in Guildford for an exciting overnight trip to experience what life was like during this time period on the Home Front.

Pupils learned about life as an evacuee and explored the roles of Air Raid Wardens as well as Home Guard soldiers.

Year 6 ventured to Bushy Park and participated in the Junior Citizen workshop. During this session, they were placed in 'real life' scenarios and learnt about ways in which they could resolve a problem if one occurred. In addition to this, they learnt about fire safety, stranger danger, how to behave near water, as well as ways in which to conduct themselves properly on a train and bus. They also learnt about how to take safe routes when travelling. This was an amazing experience and all the children thoroughly enjoyed themselves.

The next day we got to dress up as ARP wardens in blue jumpsuits. We learnt about how they used to put out fires and blackouts while going through a spooky tunnel leading to an air raid shelter. We saw how they had gasmasks for children, adults and even babies! Most of us fell asleep on the train on the way back. I couldn't wait to tell my family all about my wondrous first trip to Henley Fort.
