The week also saw several parents come in and speak to the girls about their roles in various scientific fields. This was a wonderful opportunity for our pupils to learn about the many different career opportunities linked to STEM.

On Friday, we finished the week with an action-packed science show from Professor Bubbleworks who had us all captivated with his fire tornados, amazing giant bubbles and many interactive hands-on experiments.





National Science Week

In Science this term, Year 3 have been investigating the magnetic field of a magnet. Using a magnet we were able to observe the iron fillings on the paper as they gravitated towards the poles.

For Science Week, Year 3 investigated the permeability of different soil to see which soil would be best for the growing of plants. After investigating, we found out that loam soil has the best permeability to allow water to soak through to the roots of a plant.

















Year 4 created seed bombs, a ball made of compost mixed with flour and water into which seeds have been embedded. These little balls can then be thrown and once the seeds begin to germinate, the bomb will slowly break apart. The soil will then provide a base for the seeds to start growing.

The Look Out Discovery Centre

Years 1 and 2 have been learning about nocturnal animals this term, writing stories based on 'The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark' and classifying animals by physical features, diet and habitat.

We ended the term with a trip to The Look Out Discovery Centre in Bracknell, where we linked our Science learning to the topics of light and sound and had great fun exploring the interactive exhibits.







Hounslow Urban Farm

The Reception girls had an excellent trip to Hounslow Urban Farm at the end of March. They saw lots of different farm animals as well as some exotic reptiles and fish.

Highlights included feeding the goats and sheep, seeing newborn baby lambs, and bouncing on the bouncy castle at the end of the day.















Writing Club

Writing Club has really taken off this term with the girls producing a fantastic range of writing from kennings poems to potion recipes and stories.

There is always something to inspire and the girls love being able to share what they have written at the end of each lunchtime session.

This half term the Year 6 girls have been enjoying rugby sessions led by Harlequins coaches during their PE lessons. They have been learning how to pass, score tries and tackle safely. We have been impressed by how the girls have taken on this new challenge and the resilience they have shown getting stuck into a very physical sport.

The Year 4 and 5 girls have also been enjoying their first experience of rugby in their PE lessons, with the Year 4 pupils managing to conquer the difficult concept of defensive lines and the offside rule and the Year 5 pupils showing incredible determination and toughness when tackling. A special shout out to Mavis in Year 5 who has proven herself to be a tackling machine!

There is certainly an appetite for rugby amongst the girls and we hope to continue with the sport on the curriculum next year.

Mission Marathon Fundraiser



A massive congratulations to all of the girls in Prep who took on the 'Mission Marathon' with wholehearted determination. The aim of the challenge was to see how many marathons we could collectively complete over two weeks, while raising sponsorship money for our charities.

The girls ran around a 200m track before school and at break and lunchtime, recording their laps daily. Reception and Year 1 were set a target of two laps per day, Years 2-4 were set four laps and Years 5-6 were set eight laps. Lots of the girls smashed these targets with some girls covering 8km in a day. Incredibly, several girls managed to complete individual marathon distances over the two-week challenge! The girls collectively managed to run 2,437km which equates to 57 marathons (42.195km). At the last count, the girls had raised close to £1,500 for their chosen charities, NSPCC and ARC.
