


Prep Lab Coat Competition

School Council reps have encouraged their classes to make collection boxes for crisp packets which Edie then collects and sends to a charity who turns the packets into thermal blankets for the homeless.




Visit from PC Simon


Prep pupils had the opportunity to speak with our local community police liaison officer, PC Simon, who examined many different safety topics. Our younger Prep pupils discussed road safety, including how to keep safe when crossing the road and wearing a helmet, while demonstrating their knowledge of using a zebra crossing. The girls were also able to ask PC Simon questions about his job, to learn more about what it is like to work as a police officer.

The Year 6 pupils learned about different aspects of the work he does, as well as how to stay safe online and on the streets. Year 6 learned that children between 10 and 18 years of age can be sent to secure centres if they break the law, and that a criminal record can affect their futures. PC Simon also informed the girls that the guidance for Whatsapp states that it should be used by those who are 16 and older. We would like to thank PC Simon for coming to speak to us.

Young Entrepreneurs

Year 6 has begun the 'Putting Young Minds to Work' course with Stride Ventures, an education enrichment partnership that strives to inform young people about the world of business and enterprise.
