The Path to Democracy


In conversation with a Suffragette



"Kitty Marion" suffragette



In Year 9 History we have been studying the path to Democracy. The latter half of our studies have focused on the campaign for women's suffrage. In class the girls have learnt about the imbalance of power between the sexes under British law in the nineteenth century and how both the Suffragette and Suffragist movements campaigned for the vote in the decades preceding World War I. On Friday 27 November, the girls were treated to a visit by a living historian from the Museum of London who spoke to them as Kitty Marion, regaling the girls with tales of her actions as a suffragette. Kitty's story is a fascinating account of music hall performances, arson, imprisonment, hunger strike and other acts of what the suffragettes termed 'direct action'. The girls were deeply impressed by Kitty and, when asked at the end of the performance, if they were supporters of Millicent Fawcett or Emilene Pankhurst, they were almost all in favour of team suffragette. Following their meeting with Kitty the girls took part in a classroom based plenary activity and after lunch they watched the recent film, Suffragette. It was great to see Year 9 so fired up and inspired by the actions of some of the twentieth century's most impressive female historical figures.



Year 13 need to finish any remaining sections and be ready to take part in the expeditions as soon as they are running. Mrs McPherson has kindly offered to let the girls return for expeditions in 2022, after they have left us for university, if they cannot participate this year. We hope that will not be required, but think it will be an important way to support our girls as they move on from St. Catherine's.

Book Clubs

Year 7 Book Club

The Year 7 Book Club have finished reading *The Faraway Truth* by Janae Marks.

This book is about a 12-year-old girl named Zoe who receives a letter from her father, who has been in prison since she was born, on her12th birthday. Upon reading this letter, she is confused and curious; she wants to know why her father was put in prison. When she find out there was no real evidence, she wants to prove him innocent. As a group, we tried to imagine the feelings Zoe must have felt reading this letter on her 12th birthday from her 'so-called' guilty dad. It was interesting seeing Zoe learning about miscarriages of justice and discrimination. We enjoyed the investigation aspect of the book, as Zoe tried to prove her father's innocence. But the sections about her baking hobby became a little distracting. These two strands of the book did not seem to sit very comfortably together. There were some very good characters, including Trevor, Zoe's best friend, who is very loyal and supportive of Zoe, even when she doesn't always treat him well. In a way, we would have liked it if the book had concentrated more on the investigation (including finding out who the real murderer was). However, the main character would probably have needed to be older for this to work. Overall, this is a very interesting book and the Year 7 Book Club thoroughly enjoyed reading it. We think this book would be suitable for readers in Year 6 and Year 7.

The Year 8 Book Club have finished reading *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Nighttime* by Mark Haddon.

The combination of a detective story with looking at what it is like to be autistic was an unusual one. We found it interesting to learn about what being autistic means through Christopher's eyes, and how complicated everyday life can become for someone who is autistic. Things that we take for granted can be overwhelmingly difficult, for instance travelling on the tube or speaking to strangers. On the other hand, Christopher was incredibly good at some things, like Maths and Physics. It was interesting to compare how differently Christopher's Mum and Dad handled the situation. Christopher's mum really cared for him, but found it difficult not to become frsutrated. Christopher's dad was usually much better at staying calm and being understanding, even though he did make some really serious mistakes.

It is important to remember that many people and their families deal with autism and its challenges every day. We know more about what this is like now that we have read this book.


