We are very thankful to Activ Adventures for looking after us. We would also especially like to thank Mr Cox who spent his weekend ensuring that we completed our expedition successfully.


















BLACK HISTORY & POETRY


Black History Month

Once again we were treated to the most fascinating few hours, with topics as diverse as "Should museums return all their historical artefacts to their country of origin?", "Can environmental laws save our oceans?" and "Is the world becoming a better place?". While most girls choose to write an essay, others chose the option (equivalent to the formal EPQ taken in Sixth Form) to create an artefact, with Mei H-T creating a stunning piece incorporating her research on botany and women, and Hetti R showing off a digital animation showing her design for an environmentally friendly house, created on software used by professional architects. As well as celebrating with fizzy drinks, cheesy snacks and some of our Chef's delicious homemade cookies on the night, we'll also be recognising the girls' success with a presentation in this term's final assembly. For the time-being, they are to be congratulated for their determination, self-organisation, research skills and abundant intellectual curiosity.
